

Course Description

LAW COURSES IN ENGLISH

LAWB 1312: COMPARATIVE COMMERCIAL LAW

This course intends to impart law students with the general knowledge of Commercial law and its practice. The course is designed specifically to provide law students with an understanding of various aspects of Contracts and the amorphous nature of its performance, remedies and liabilities for breach of Contracts. The course will also cover Sales of Good Act, and Partnership. Laws of other nations will be discussed to have an understanding of variations local laws of commerce and their impact on international commercial transactions.

LAWB 2315: COMPARATIVE CRIMINAL LAW

This course is an introduction to Criminal Law and examines the structure of the western legal system and the nature of criminal law, its enforcement, and the responsibilities of judges in advancing and maintaining rules of law based upon political goals, and society's welfare. The course will devote time to examine to indictment procedure and the penal code. The course will also include compare and contrast various criminal laws of different nations. This exercise will explore how and why the rights of defendant and the duties of a State differ including the variations in the penal codes in different countries.

LAWB 3316: COMPARATIVE LABOUR & EMPLOYMENT LAW

This course examines the history of the labor law and its development. The course will compare the rights & duties of an employee as compared to the rights & duties of an employer. The issues of the workforce in the arena of globalization will be discussed and problem with illegal labor force. Loyalty towards an employee or toward an organization in modern times will also be explored.

The course will also compare and contrast various laws of different countries. This exercise will explore how and why the Rights and Duties of employers & employees are defined in differently in different countries.

LAWB 3319: COMPARATIVE CONSTITUTIONAL LAW

Constitutional Law is the study of the principal sources and powers of a nation. Primarily focused on the United States' Constitution; it will also focus its attention on constitution of other countries including the governance system of the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia. This exercise will consist of comparing and contrasting various laws of different nations. This exercise will

explore how and why the rights and duties of a nation, as well as of an individual are defined in different countries.

LAWB 3220: TORT LAW

In this course the evolution of legal principles of civil wrong in common law systems will be explored. Further, the student will analyze the responsibility in tort for wrongs to the person and property. Topics such as intentional acts, negligence, liability, and harm to reputation will also be discussed.

LAWB 3221: INTERNATIONAL LAW

This course intends to teach law students general knowledge of private international law and public international law. The course is designed specifically to provide law students with an understanding of the theories, historical significance and the amorphous nature of International Law. The course teaches such concepts as, sovereignty, statehood, jurisdiction, occupation, diplomatic relations and various frameworks of treaties. The value of citizenship will also be explored.

LAWB 3222: COMPARATIVE FAMILY LAW

This course teaches the principles and policies of modern family law. The course's objective is to make students understand the various aspects of family laws and how they interact with the institution of marriage. The course will devote some time in analyzing family laws of other countries. This exercise will explore how and why different laws effects differently towards the rights and duties of family members in various jurisdictions.

LAWB 4216: EVIDENCE

This course teaches the detail process of the western perspective of how evidence is identified, preserved and presented in the courtroom. The course will further explore evidence that is permissible in the court and the one that is inadmissible. Students will be able to understand the reasons and rational behind courts' rules and regulations of impermissibility of evidence through cases.

LAWB 4218: COMPARATIVE PROPERTY LAW

This course introduces to the students the evolutions of property laws. Topics in this course will include: ownership, right to exclude and the right to use reasonably, landlord and tenant law etc. Some laws of other jurisdictions will be explored. This exercise will explore how different property laws can have different affects on nations, economically as well as ethically.

LAWB 4222: LEGAL ETHICAL CONDUCT

This course teaches the ethical conduct of legal practice with different clientele. Emphasis will be given on regulation of lawyers through rules of legal professional conduct codes and regulations. Topics such as, confidentiality, conflict of interest, advocacy in criminal cases, malpractice and duties to the court and community at large will be explored.
